PRESIDENT'S LETTER

David was just a teenager when he was anointed as king over Israel. When God sent Samuel to Jesse, David's father, saying that one of his sons was selected by God to be the next king of Israel, Jesse brought his oldest seven sons in, but Samuel said that God had selected none of them. David was in the fields, shepherding the flocks, and when he was brought before Samuel, God revealed that David, the least of the sons, was the one chosen by Him.

As we know, after David lived his life, God made the statement that David was a "man after My own heart, who will do all My will" (Acts 13:22). That says a lot about David as a teenager and a man who lived his life yielded to God.

While Jesus Christ is our perfect example of the way of life God would have us live, the accounts we have of David as a teenager, young adult and king over a very wealthy nation provide a pretty good "roadmap" for one's life.

We read in the Psalms of David spending his nights in the field, shepherding the flocks, meditating on God's laws, looking at the night sky and wondering about God's awesome power. He contemplated the meaning of life, concluding that God's way of life is superior, leading to joy, peace and all things good. He prayed and communicated with God, and became strong in his faith.

As a teenager, that strength and faith, which came from his relationship with God and the hours he spent in meditating on and knowing God's law, displayed itself in the dramatic story of the confrontation with the giant, Goliath.

While the army of Israel, comprised of men 20 and older stood in fear of the giant who challenged them daily, teenage David did not hesitate, but stood strong in his faith and boldly announced he would fight Goliath. Saul marveled at the strength of this "youth," as he called him (1 Samuel 17:33).

This year's camp theme is "Stand Strong." At camp, you will learn many things about this principle from the Bible. Listen to everything you hear, take notes and read Scripture. The Bible is the Word of God. He has given us these words to encourage, instruct and guide us in His way (2 Timothy 3:16–17). But reading and hearing aren't enough. You must think on

these things (Philippians 4:8) and make the time to meditate on the words of life.

David faced many challenges, and certainly in his teenage years. None of us has stood in front of a king and asked to fight a literal giant like Goliath whose mission was to kill us. But make no mistake: Teenagers today are faced with battles and challenges not unlike those that confronted David.

The world we live in is a dangerous place. There are many voices out there that will confuse you, if you let them. They may try to cause you to question authority, saying that the Bible is antiquated and not written for today's "enlightened age." They may lead you to question your purpose and even the basics of life. They may lead you to question your sexuality or even your gender. Like Goliath, those forces want to overcome you and kill you.

As you face these challenges now and in the future, you must stand strong in your commitment to God and His way, and choose the path that leads to life, not only in this physical world, but also eternal life with God. You are called, you are chosen and God opens your mind to the truth.

Take the example of teenager David, who frequently spent time contemplating God's Word and in prayer to Him. Take a break from your smartphone—from texting, surfing the Internet, Instagram and TikTok. Take time away from your usual TV, movies and music. Those may entertain you, but will they lead you to stand strong?

Stand strong and start building that strength now by choosing to earnestly develop your relationship with God and contemplate the wisdom and truth of the Scriptures, which will put you in good stead and enable you to stand against the wiles of the devil and this world (Ephesians 6:10–11).

APPLYING FOR CAMP

Whether you plan to attend as a camper or as staff, being part of camp can be the highlight of the year! With some planning ahead of time and filling out your application completely and in a timely manner, you can make the process easier and seamless for everyone. Here are a few things to think about as you plan.

- 1. Plan early! Decide which camp or camps you want to attend. Pay attention to the dates and do not apply for two camps if they overlap, either as a camper or staff.
- 2. Earn and save for camp. Thanks to generous support from the United Church of God, tuition for UYC programs is subsidized to reduce your cost, but there is a tuition fee and often families find they need to save ahead of time in anticipation of camp. Many campers find that they appreciate the camp experience more if they work during the year and save as much as they can for tuition. If

you are planning to be a camper this year, talk to your parents about possible ways to earn some of the tuition. You might be surprised at the possibilities!

- **3. Apply online.** The webpage for camp applications will be open by March 1. You will need some basic information such as your address, phone numbers, medical insurance coverage and medication or allergy needs.
- 4. Read the acceptance e-mail carefully! If you are accepted to camp, you will receive an acceptance e-mail so please take time for you and your parents to review it. The acceptance e-mail will include details for the specific camp and a transportation form that needs to be filled out as soon as you know your travel plans.
- 5. Get prepared physically. The camp schedule is full of activities often from sunrise until after sunset and therefore may be more physically demanding than you may be used to. The activities are very enjoyable

and rewarding when all campers fully participate in everything. Stay active in the weeks before camp, so you are physically fit for the camp activities. More information should be included in your acceptance letter so you can begin preparing.

6. Get prepared mentally and spiritually. During the weeks before camp, spend extra time praying about camp and what you will learn from being a part of it. Be sure you are ready to abide by the rules established. This would also be a good time to review the "Standards of Appearance and Conduct" posted at: uyc.ucg. org/standards-appearanceand-conduct and some of the Teen Bible Study Guides posted at: ucg.org/bible-studytools/teen-bible-study-guides. These resources are helpful to review and think about even while applying for camp, but certainly before attending.

STANDARDS OF APPEARANCE AND CONDUCT

All United Youth Camps maintain a high standard of conduct and attire, based on God's laws, which is further stated in the Code of Honor. These standards and rules include, but are not limited to:

- Your clothing and appearance must be modest and in good taste.
- Wearing revealing or other inappropriate apparel will not be allowed.
- Inappropriate wording, messages or images on clothing or camp gear will not be allowed.
- Dresses and skirts should be approximately knee length or longer.
- All shorts must have at least a 3-inch inseam.
- Swimwear must be modest one-piece or tankini for ladies; standard trunk or board short for guys. Tankinis are permitted for ladies provided they meet the following guidelines: reasonable boy-cut shorts or standard bottoms, no French-cut or bikini bottoms; full coverage tops and no exposed waist area or cleavage.
- Hair should be a natural color and hair length should be appropriate (short for boys, longer for girls).
- Jewelry for body piercings (other than earrings for girls) will not be allowed. All jewelry must be removed during daily activities. Details will be in your camp acceptance letter.
- Tattoos (permanent or temporary) must be covered at all times.
- The use or possession of alcohol, tobacco products, vaping products, marijuana (including any of its products, CBDs) even for a claimed medical treatment, or illegal drugs or drug paraphernalia, may result in immediate dismissal from camp.
- Sexual misconduct, theft, disorderly conduct, profanity, destruction of property or refusal to cooperate fully with the camp staff may result in immediate dismissal from camp.

Do Not Bring

- Tight, revealing or inappropriate clothing, short shorts, clothing that shows underwear, leggings/tights/yoga pants (unless worn under appropriate clothing), crop-tops, halter-tops, backless tops, strapless tops, or plunging necklines. There should be no bare midriffs.
- Expensive jewelry, including valuable watches, or large amounts of cash.
- Rollerblades, skateboards or scooters.
- Alcohol, tobacco products, vaping products, marijuana (including any of its products, CBDs) even for a claimed medical treatment, or illegal drugs.
 All prescription drugs, medications and supplements must be turned in at registration to the camp medical team.
- Electronics. Cell phones, smartwatches and electronics must be turned in at registration and will be returned at check-out. Cell phones may be used to call home during camp but only with the camp director's approval.
- Cards or games.
- Snacks. No "care packages" of snacks or sweets mailed to campers or staff.
- Matches, lighters, fireworks, firearms, knives, pocketknives, multitools or similar items unless written permission is given by the camp director.

We've moved! After 12 years at Camp Luz, we are moving to the 220+ acre Camp Lazarus Boy Scout camp in Delaware, Ohio, just north of Columbus, Ohio. ACCIDENTS HAPPEN

Even when you think you've done all you can to avoid them, accidents can still happen. The question is, when they do, are you prepared? The Church provides an accident-medical policy to help cover some of the cost for injuries that can occur at camp. The Church desires to provide this coverage each camp year, but that is subject to change based on availability and affordability.

As camp approaches, a copy of the policy will be provided so parents and volunteer staff can see what is and isn't covered. Be sure to check it out online in early June for the 2024 policy and claim form. In the event of an accident, the camp director will send a partially completed insurance claim form home from camp with an injured camper. However, timely notification to the insurance carrier and filing of the claim is the responsibility of the camper's family and not United Youth Camps or the medical facility where they may be treated. This information can also be found at uyc.ucg.org/camp-accident-insurance.



Here is a brief description of what is typically included:

- The policy will pay primary (first) before other personal or group insurance. There
 is no deductible.
- Must file notice of the incident within 30 days and initial medical expenses must be incurred within 90 days.
- Benefits paid for expenses incurred for up to three years after the incident.
- Includes a \$10,000 accidental death benefit (subject to a policy aggregate maximum).
- The accident expense limit is \$25,000.
